You would have received an Audiri message in the holidays notifying you of changes to the **parking signage** around the school, particularly on Sutcliffe Street. Please check all relevant signage before you park your car.



NO STOPPING:

The NO STOPPING symbol means you are not permitted to stop unless traffic conditions require it (e.g.in a queue of traffic). These zones are created for road safety.

NOTE: The Supreme Court of South Australia has decided that driving a vehicle backwards and forwards in a No Stopping Zone while waiting (e.g. to pick up a passenger) amounts to "STOPPING". The arrow points to the area you are not allowed to stop in. These signs will often have times that NO STOPPING is allowed.



NO PARKING:

The NO PARKING symbol means you may stop for a maximum of two minutes. The driver must be in attendance and not more than three metres from the vehicle.

Some No Parking signs do not apply for certain vehicles (e.g. emergency services). In these cases, the excepted vehicles may stop for an unlimited period. The arrow points to the area you are not allowed to park in. These signs will often have times that NO PARKING is allowed.

This term we have the opportunity to provide feedback on our school through the Living, **Learning, Leading Survey (LLL)**.

The Living Learning Leading Framework gives us a foundation for understanding what we do in Catholic Education – who we are, what we value and how we partner with our families to ensure our students thrive.

The staff and students will all complete this survey at school, but we also need your participation in this survey, for without your input we cannot know how things are going for you and your children at St. Martin's. The feedback we will receive will not include the data of individuals, rather, graphs based on feedback from all parents and carers.

There are no right or wrong answers as it is your impressions that we are seeking. If you have more than one child at our school, please answer the questions for your oldest child at St. Martin's.

The response format requires you to consider our school's performance for each statement on a scale from 1 to 6 (with 1 being the lowest or worst score and 6 being the highest or best.

The survey should take between three and five minutes to complete. As an added incentive, we are offering a \$100 restaurant voucher, randomly drawn, to one of our families who have completed the survey. Gospel Reflection from Greg Sunter

In this week's Gospel, Jesus describes the kingdom through images. Throughout the Gospels, Jesus consistently uses the figures of speech of simile and metaphor to describe the kingdom. God never directly describes the kingdom. It is always described as being like some situation or person or as if... This figurative use of language means that we have no single clear picture of what the kingdom is like, but we do have a multitude of metaphors and descriptions. This style of description adds to the paradoxical nature of the kingdom – it is like many things, yet we don't really know what it is like at all.

Think about: Why might Jesus have given dozens of different descriptions of what the kingdom is 'like'? In what ways can we get 'glimpses' of the kingdom? In what ways can you be a 'glimpse of the kingdom' for others?

Sustainability Lunchbox tips:

No packages – Nude Food every day at St Martin's! Don't forget to pack your child's/childrens snack, recess and lunch without any wrappers. Use reusable plastic containers or sandwich cloths to package food.

Students will be asked to take any packaging home. Do not over pack your child's/ children's lunchbox with food.

Write a list of your child's/children's favourite school lunch foods and involve them in this process. Pack the night before and keep costs down by not buying snack sized packages. Vary fillings of sandwiches and remind children to put any uneaten food back into lunch boxes.

Include finger food cut into bite sized pieces and limit junk food or treats as processed foods are not nutritional for growing children.

Ideas for what to pack: sandwiches, chopped fruit and vegetables, small whole orange/banana/apple, berries/mandarin/grapes, cheese cubes, dip, yoghurt in small tubs, crackers/cruskits/saladas, home-made muffins, cakes and muesli bar slices, pizza, salad - carrot/cucumber /capsicum sticks/snow peas/small tomatoes, popcorn – air popped, dried fruit, sultanas, sushi, hardboiled egg, water – not juice or cordial.

Answers from individual surveys will NOT be reported back to the school. National School Improvement Partnerships staff are bound by a Code of Ethics and follow strict professional conduct. To protect your anonymity, we do not report scores for groups of less than four parents or caregivers.

Use of the data

National School Improvement Partnerships will report the results to the school in an aggregated format. To enable drill-down reporting, the information provided to the school will contain data based on background information. This anonymous data will be provided to CESA for reporting and consideration of support for schools.

How to complete the survey

- For each statement, you are asked to rate how well you think the school is performing by selecting one of six responses.
 The responses are numbered 1 to 6, with number 1 being the lowest or worst rating and number 6 being the highest or best rating.
- If you have more than one child at the school, and your perceptions differ for each child, please respond with respect
 to your perceptions related to the oldest child enrolled at the school.
- · There are no 'right' or 'wrong' answers. Your opinion is what is wanted.
- · Please answer all questions.
- Some statements may be fairly similar to other statements. Don't worry about this. Simply give your opinion about all statements.

Charter for Parents in SA Catholic Schools

* Parents is a collective term that includes carers and legal guardians

A thriving relationship between parents and schools provides a powerful environment for the flourishing of each and every child. Within this relationship, both parents and schools have distinct responsibilities to nurture a strong ongoing partnership.

The Partnership recognises:

- The primary role parents play in their child's faith formation, learning and wellbeing
- · The contribution that parents make by valuing the Catholic identity and mission of the schools
- The shared responsibility for the social, spiritual and emotional development of our students in our schools.

Parents

Our parents can expect their child's school will:

- Provide an excellent holistic education inspired by Catholic teachings and traditions
- Ensure high quality curriculum, pedagogy, assessment and reporting practices are delivered
- Strive to create an inclusive environment which values and respects the diversity of faith and cultures across the school community
- Model Christian values with all members of the school community
- Provide timely and accurate information on their child's progress
- Communicate clearly and effectively to enable a mutually supportive environment
- Provide staff with professional development opportunities to maintain currency and expertise
- Demonstrate respect for the privacy of families in all interactions, including through the use of technology and social media
- Encourage parents to ask questions and speak to their child's teacher or member of the school leadership team at a mutually convenient time
- Allow any concern to be heard and commit to ongoing respectful relationships
- Address parent concerns in accordance with the school's grievance procedure and the Complaint Response and Resolution Procedure (CESA).

Schools

Our schools can expect that parents will:

- Act as positive advocates and first educators for their children
- Work in partnership with schools and parishes to achieve the best possible outcome for each student
- · Support the spiritual and faith culture of the school
- · Support their child's learning at school and home
- Respect the skills, knowledge and experience of school leaders and teachers
- Model respectful behaviour within the school community in both real and digital worlds
- Listen, talk collaboratively and share relevant information with teachers and school staff to understand and resolve any issues and concerns
- Respect the privacy of every member of the school community - students, parents and staff
- Support the school expectations and guidelines that are in place for the wellbeing and effective learning of students
- Contribute to a safe school community where intimidation, bullying or harassment are not acceptable behaviours
- Adhere to the financial commitments made at the time of enrolment including payment of all fees and levies in a timely manner
- Promote and encourage a collective responsibility to support the Charter for Parents in SA Catholic Schools.
